


At the annual meeting, we will announce results of the election of new board members and the proposed bylaw modifications. Please see the separate article in this Trail-Letter.

Wisdom of the Ages by Deb Thompson

Back in June, a number of trail fans met at Kurnick trailhead to dedicate a monument honoring the Trail's founders. This event brought up some nostalgic thoughts.

In 1989, the first Internet service providers came into existence, the Berlin Wall came down, a gallon of gasoline cost 97 cents, and a group of friends met to start an effort to develop a trail on the recently abandoned Montour Railroad.

The story of the Trail's founders illustrates the importance of two old adages: "Strike while the iron is hot", and "Choose your friends wisely." Had they waited to act, the railroad corridor may not have been available. And had the group not included people with the range of skills, knowledge, and dedication necessary, they may have not been up to the task.

30 plus years later, and thanks to the continuous efforts of our volunteers, the Montour Trail is here as a great regional asset, proving two more adages: "There is strength in numbers", and "Slow and steady wins the race." We owe our success to the contributions of innumerable volunteers providing labor, skills, time, and knowledge, incrementally adding to the trail year-in and year-out.

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Board Nominees and By-Law Changes Continues from page 1

Dennis Pfeiffer is a retired Assistant Vice President in Telecommunications from PNC and has been volunteering with the MTC since November of 1989. Dennis served as president in 2000, 2004 2006, 2013 - 2014 and 2018. He founded the Engineering & Construction Committee in 2000 and led our efforts to secure the MTC Bridgeville office in 2001. Since 1993 he has been active in the Airport Area Friends and has been the project manager of numerous construction projects. His current project is completing the Coraopolis Connector; he also recently managed construction of the western corridor garage located at Milepost 5.9.

Jim Richter retired in 2015 after a 45-year career working with local and state non-profit organizations. He served as treasurer of the Pittsburgh Community Reinvestment Group, founding Trustee of the Bethel Park Community Foundation, and board member of the Bethel Park Soccer Association. He also is active with the Bethel Park Friends of the Trail. Jim studied Public Administration at the University of Pittsburgh's Graduate School of Public and International Affairs, English Literature at Pitt, and music education at Duquesne University. Jim has been active with the Montour Trail Council for six years and is chair of the Friends Groups Engagement and Enhancement Committee. Jim is nominated for his second term as a MTC board member.

Proposed Changes to MTC Bylaws

The MTC Board periodically recommends modifications to MTC Bylaws. The last revisions were approved in 2018. There are four changes proposed for 2022; see the ballot for proposed language.

ARTICLE VI - OFFICERS, Section 2, Paragraph 2.

Paragraph 2 enables the President, with the approval of the Executive Committee, to respond to emergency situations that may occur between monthly board meetings. The proposed revision increases the level of unbudgeted funds needed to meet the emergency to \$10,000 and makes wording changes to eliminate redundancy.

ARTICLE VII – EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE, Section 1. Responsibility.

If approved, redundant language in this paragraph would be replaced by a reference to Article VI Section 2 (see above).

ARTICLE VII – EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE, Section 2. Composition.

Along with the four MTC Officers, the preceding President may currently be asked to a member of the Executive Committee for the year immediately following the preceding President's term. This proposed change extends the time period beyond a single year.

ARTICLE XIII - FINANCE, Section 3.

MTC checks, drafts, notes, and other instruments of indebtedness must currently be signed by either the President or Treasurer and one other member of the Executive Committee. This requirement results in delays in processing invoices when individual Executive Committee members are unable to sign due to travel or other personal circumstances. The proposed change enables two other individuals—the Finance Committee chair and the Business Operations Manager—to co-sign these instruments.

MONTOUR RAILROAD HISTORY

Clinton Block Mine No. 1

The Clinton No. 1 Mine was serviced by Montour trains. It was located about two miles from Imperial on the north side of U.S. Route 30. The mine was in the area between Route 30, the Findlay Township Sports Complex, and the airport I-376 & PA 576 interchange. The Airport Connector segment of the Montour Trail runs along the east and north edges of the mine area.

The mine was owned by the Clinton Block Coal Company, which was formed and opened the mine in 1917. The Coal Company also built a tipple loading facility and the Clinton Block railroad spur to service the mine.


The Clinton Block Spur left the Montour Railroad main track a short distance west of Route 30 in Imperial (near Trail Milepost 9) and followed the North Fork of Montour Run up the west side of Route 30 to a grade crossing just south of the Burgettstown Road intersection. The old right-of-way going up to the mine is about a tenth of a mile beyond the entrance to the Findlay Township Sports Complex. Trains using the Clinton Spur (later named the Clinton Block Branch) would have to run past the switch at Clinton Block Junction and then back into the spur and shove cars up to the mine. At the time the spur was built, the Coal Company said it would run no more than six trains per day at speeds not to exceed 15 mph. Since the spur was built by the Coal Company the Montour did not own or maintain the tracks but did supply all railroad service.

With the coal seam outcropping directly onto the hillside, no vertical shafts were needed to access the coal, and Clinton No. 1 began as a drift mine with workings on both sides of Route 30. It also operated as a strip mine beginning in 1918. Underground workings primarily worked the coal to the northwest and southwest, with the stripping operations working to the northeast. With only 40 or 50 feet of overburden needing to be removed to reach the coal seam, stripping operations using a large steam shovel were economically feasible.

Information about the stripping operation in 1920 shows a large steam shovel was used to remove the overburden soil. Its digging bucket could remove 6 cubic yards in a single bite. A smaller loading shovel was used in the coal seam to dig out the coal and send it to the cleaning tipple.

The accompanying magazine ad circa 1929 touts a rebuilt tipple and cleaning facility at the mine. Coal was cleaned and processed at the mine site, and thus could be shipped directly to customers. The ad shows several Montour hopper cars being loaded at the new tipple.

Production records from the 1930's showed both deep and strip mining with coal shipped by rail and trucks. Average mine employment was 132 men with a peak of 226 in 1932 and 1940. Coal shipments declined through the 1930's and by 1941 employment was down to 68 miners in the deep mine and 17 at the strip mine. Rail shipment records end in 1940, and after that time, coal was shipped by trucks. In 1942, the mine was bought by the Union Colliery Company. It was then taken over by the Pittsburgh Consolidation Coal Company in 1944.

The Clinton Block Branch was also the location of a Peoples Natural Gas compressor station that used steam-driven compressors and coal-fired boilers. Coal was delivered from an adjacent mine via an inclined plane. This mine may have been privately owned as there are no records for it. There was a short railroad spur at the compressor station into the 1940's.
