WESTLAND MEETING

On Monday, April 5th, several members of the Montour Trail Council met with the Westland Citizen's Development Association (WCDA). Westland is a former coal mining community located on PA Route 519 between Houston and Hickory. It was the site of the last active mine served by the Montour Railroad. The railroad reached Westland via a four mile spur that joined the mainline at Gilmore Junction.

The WCDA is building a 12 acre park on land left vacant by Consolidation Coal Company which operated the mine. This park will be an ideal terminus for the Westland Branch of the Trail. Like the MTC, the WCDA is a grass roots organization that is scraping and clawing its way to success by utilizing many routes to reach their goals at minimum cost. The WDCA looks forward to seeing the Trail reach their park and MTC looks forward to seeing their park at the end of our trail. Both groups agreed to assist each other to see that their goals are met.

Gin Romiti, the Fundraising Director of the WCDA wrote this letter of thanks to the MTC dated April 15, 1993. It speaks for itself:

Members of the Trail Council,

Thank you so much for your wonderful presentation at our April 5th meeting, and thank you for your vote of confidence in our efforts.

Many things in this country are neglected when they no longer represent substantial monetary units, but both of our groups believe that not everything that is important can be turned into a numerical indicator. Both of our groups believe in revitalization and preservation. And, both groups understand that we cannot operate in a vacuum. Through your openness and sincere dedication, Westlanders feel that there is now a mechanism for cooperation and partnership; a vital element in achieving our goals. 
MOON- ROBINSON PROGRESS REPORT by Tim Killmeyer



MARATHON

We were involved in setting up and maintaining the first water station located at Butler and 47th streets, which is the 2.5 mile point at the race. TREE PLANTING

On Saturday, May 1, 1993, seven volunteers planted approximately 400, three-year old Colorado Spruce seedlings along the Cecil Township section of the Trail. The volunteers met at the Hendersonville Shoppes that morning 10:00 A.M. and set out under the guidance of Mr. Niles "Doug" Douglas to plant the seedlings. The seedlings ranged in height from two to six inches with roots that were two to three times as long. They are located 10 feet from the trail edge and spaced about 20 feet apart from the Hendersonville terminus to the I-79 overpass.

A few more were planted near Papp Road, the Kurnick property (the bootleg parking area off Cecil-Henderson Road) and a small section east of Dacor Drive to the "cut". Generally, the seedlings were placed on both sides of the Trail. Currently they may be hidden by tall grass, but should soon rise to a more visible height with a favorable growing season.

There are still 600 seedlings waiting to be planted and there will be another planting session organized. So, if you missed this event, you have another chance to get down and dirty. MTC, Doug, and I would like to thank Don Berty, Greg and Ginny Haid, Beth Syche, and Alan for helping out with the first tree planting session.

Bell Atlantic has provided a couple of cellular phones for communications.


Moon Township Municipal Authority has allowed us to keep our tractor on their secured property to keep it safe and local.

ISTEA EXPLAINED

Just about everyone is aware that the Montour Trail Council was programed for 80% reimbursement up to \$1,000,000 from the Federal Highway Administration by monies provided by the Intermodal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act of 1991 (ISTEA), but this money will not come in one lump sum, nor without lots of red tape.

Like any other highway project, trail construction plans will have to under go environmental reviews that may take six months to a year before any monies can be approved for construction. Most importantly, however, the money is provided for reimbursement of the construction costs we incur on the project. So we need to spend money before we can get money. A delay will occur before we are reimbursed after we submit our request to PennDot. We will get 80% of our expenditure back to spend again.

So even though we have been approved for this money, our funding problems are not over. We still need money for the daily operations of the Council, in addition to the money for construction.

BULLETIN - PUC BRIDGE DECISION

Briefly, the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission has given the Trail Council a very favorable decision regarding the crossing. They stated that any crossing (i.e. bridge) that is not a hazard to traffic should remain in place for trail use and the crossing be removed from PUC jurisdiction. More details in the next newsletter.

ROAD IMPROVEMENTS AT HENDERSONVILLE

The Trail Council has finally completed an agreement with PennDot District 12 to assist us in removing the west abutment of the former bridge that crossed Washington Pike in Hendersonville. Cecil Township, along with help from Sluciak Contractiing Company is finishing the task of removing 30 feet of the embankment west of the abutment and grading the remaining slope. PennDot will remove the concrete abutment and provide the Trail Council a no-fee permit to construct a bridge over the road.

This task will greatly improve the sight distance at a very bad intersection with Washington Pike, Cecil-Hendersonville Road, Railroad Street and Georgetown Road. PennDot will give the okay to replace the bridge. The bridge is likely to be the "recycled Barner Hill Bridge", which once spanned the Conrail main line near Irwin. This bridge was carefully dismantled by the contractor replacing that bridge, Mid-States Steel Construction of Eighty-Four. They are currently storing the bridge for us. We will be needing volunteers in the near future to help sandblast and paint the steel. Contact George Erbrecht at 356-4613, if interested.

While on the subject of bridges, MTC would like to thank Joe Stewart for letting us use part of his property to store another bridge. As you head west on the Trail from Hendersonville, you may have noticed two green trusses sitting in the yard on the left side of the Trail in the vicinity of our red road grader. This is the bridge we bought last winter which once spanned a stream in southwest Greene County. It too will need to be rehabilitated before it finds a home on the trail.
