This Year's IKEA Race Breaks Records

The 8th annual Ikea / Montour Trail Half Marathon and 5K Run and Walk took place on Saturday Sept. 13th. This year's event will top all previous years in terms of registered participants (1,280) and money raised (projected at approximately \$19,000).

Our work with IKEA this year was especially enjoyable because of Ellen Douglas, the new IKEA PR person, who took great interest in the event. Ellen told us that one of the reasons that she wanted to become the PR person for IKEA was to work on the event. This vear was a true collaboration between IKEA and the Montour Trail. The evolution of the shirt layout best exemplifies that collaborative effort. At our first event meeting I suggested a tribute to the McDonald Trestle for the theme for this year's shirt. Ellen rode out to McDonald and took a digital photograph of the Trestle. She and Todd Barnes (Recipient of the Golden Spike Award for IKEA at the McDonald Trestle Ground breaking) then used graphic enhancement software to develop the final artwork for the front of the shirt. I am amazed how it all came together, and we have had many compliments on the finished product. But those wearing the event shirts will remember more importantly the opening of the McDonald Trestle (story page 4) for many years. Who knows where our shirts will travel spreading the word about the great trestle opening!

Laura Orr did a great job in her first year as our Registrar. Her husband Bill Orr, a competitive biker and runner himself, worked side by side with her. Laura also recruited North Park Club House to provide some post race food. Great Job Laura and Bill! They served a cold pasta salad and fruit, which was excellent!

This year was our first experience with timing chips. The runners were given their chips before the event to attach to their shoes. After the runners crossed the finish line we had to retrieve the chips from the runners. We set up a "Chip Recovery Area" near the gazebo. My wife Dianne was responsible for that operation and did a great job along with all of our volunteers.

Jimmy Hamilton won the men's race, but this was not a surprise for me. Many years ago while working for Dravo, I was a member and, then, President of the Dravo running club. One of our activities was to run road races. Every year we had a group that traveled to Wheeling to run the Wheeling Distance Race. Wheeling was a grueling 20K Road Race which was deliberately laid out to encompass every hill in Wheeling. One year, Harry Hamilton, one of our members, brought along his younger brother Jimmy. You guessed it! Jimmy finished well ahead of all of us. Even as a high school youth Jimmy was an excellent runner. At age 34, Jimmy won our half marathon this year in a time of 1:09:30, running a 5:18 pace per mile. Congratulations to Jimmy and all of the great runners who participated in this year's event.

Trail Talk

Why is it that we so often measure our lives by the seasons that pass? Certainly it is more than a matter of laziness or "appropriate" conversation (as in, it's always better to talk about the weather than more serious matters). Particularly as we age, the days and months quickly morph into seasons and years.

When I was young, I always loved autumn: the vibrant colors, the crisp cool evenings, the anticipation of winter and snowy fun. Now, as I have grown older, I rather prefer spring with its budding flowers and sudden burst of green that appears after the first good rainfall. I suppose this change in attitude is because I understand the greater metaphor that is autumn: All things pass; all things die.

We mourn a passing of our own at the Montour Trail Council. Longtime MTC member Dick Quasey passed away in early September from a cerebral hemorrhage. Dick was enjoying his passion of the outdoors, fishing in Ontario with his sons, when he was struck down at age 79.

To those who never knew Dick, it is difficult to do him justice in mere words. Of course there were many accolades, many achievements, many important and not so important remembrances of all he accomplished over nearly eight decades on this planet.

But all those accomplishments don't explain or adequately describe the effect he had when walking into a room. He was a reasonably tall man, but he always seemed to fill whatever space he was in. He was huge! Not in body, but in aura. He commanded respect and admiration wherever he went.

And he had a really good sense of humor.

All of which helped him in his quest to build a trail system from the old railways. Dick was sort of a father figure to most of us at the MTC (and that's not a statement about his age!). He just took charge and never minced words or feelings. Just like when you are a child you expect "Dad" to get things done and would never lose faith in his ability, so you would always rest assured that if Dick said he was going to do something, he would get it done and get it done in superior fashion.

So we have suffered a tremendous loss at the MTC: We have lost a leader, a friend, a truly good man.

And while nobody can say for certain, we feel sure that Dick's main desire would be for us to finish our work of building the Montour. Something that will live beyond us all. Season after season after season. In perpetuity.

TrestleFest -- A Memorable Milestone

They arrived on foot, on bikes, and in shuttle vans. An estimated 800 to 1,000 Trail supporters added their presence to the Montour Trail TrestleFest on Saturday, September 6, helping to dedicate and open a key link of the Trail: the 960-foot McDonald Trestle and the new 5-mile trail section immediately to its south. Completion of this section brings the total length of trail thus far completed to 22.3 contiguous miles (39 total miles), adapting the largest structure of the former Montour Railroad for safe use as an elevated crossing for Trail users. It was indeed an occasion for celebration.


The opening ceremony began with the playing of our national anthem by the Canon-McMillan High School Band. MTC President Peter Kohnke introduced Master of Ceremonies Ted Sohier of WQED-FM, who in turn called on an impressive assembly of dignitaries, including State Senator Barry Stout, State Representatives Mark Mustio and Vic Lescovitz, Washington County Commissioner Bracken Burns, Sheriff Larry Maggi, a representative of County Commissioner Diana Irey, and Kathy Pippy, wife of State Senator John Pippy (on duty in Iraq). The traditional ribbon-cutting followed, opening the way for many to take their first walk or ride across the trestle.

After the ceremony, festival goers found a number of attractions spaced out over a quarter-mile of the former approach track, ranging from pony rides and a petting zoo to a display of the Fire Safety

House and McDonald Volunteer Fire Department's ladder truck. The beautifully clear weather and calm winds enabled Roy Weil to offer rides in his tethered hot-air balloon – the "Emerald Shazam." The musical group Acousticity gave forth with blues and folk-flavored musical selections. The Grill Guyz and McDonald Tastee-Freez offered sausages, hot dogs, and drinks. And a total of 15 different civic, conservation, and recreation organizations set up booths and displays.

Richard Quasey: Mentor, Friend and a Man who Left his Mark

We were all saddened with the passing of our good friend and trail council member Richard Quasey on September 4, 2003. Dick had a cerebral hemorrhage while on a fishing trip with his three sons in Ontario, Canada. Dick passed away in a hospital in Sunbury, Ontario. He will be greatly missed by all of us who had the pleasure of knowing and working with him.

Dick dedicated countless hours to all aspects of building and maintaining our beloved Montour Trail. His contributions to the Montour Trail were numerous. Dick was President of the Montour Trail Council in 1998—1999. His leadership qualities were especially valued when leading the way on some very special construction projects. Three projects in particular come to mind.



In the fall of 1993, Dick lead an effort with a volunteer crew to refurbish a 90-foot-long bridge near trail mile 3.4 in Robinson & Moon Townships. This bridge became know as the "volunteer" bridge and was completed in October of 1993. After ten years, volunteers involved with this bridge project still talk about the great experience Dick created for them with his superb planning and leadership qualities.

In 2000. Dick lead another volunteer effort to build new abutments and install a new bridge over Rt. 980 at Quicksilver Road. Dick's leadership and coordination skills with the two other project leaders (Jack Peth & Ned Williams) made this project a huge success.

The latest project Dick was involved with was the McDonald Trestle in Robinson Township to Venice trail section along with the improvements to the Cecil section. Dick handled many aspects of this project. The most critical of these was leading a volunteer inspection crew for this federal PENNDOT administered TEA21 project. Dick coordinated his efforts with Ed Taylor the MTC project manager. This was a new highly detailed and paperwork intensive experience for the Montour Trail
