## On account of the "count"

On August 1, two infrared break beam traffic counters were installed on the Montour Trail in Allegheny County. One was installed in Robinson Township. And the other in Findlay. After just one full week of operation, the count was 2750 in Robinson and 3672 in Findlay.

This equipment was

installed to support the economic impact study being conducted by the Allegheny Trail Alliance. The ATA is a coalition made up of seven groups, including one based in Maryland, whose purpose is to build and maintain the trail to Cumberland, where it will connect with the C & O Canal Towpath to Washington, D.C.

Part of this study, other than traffic counts, will be a survey of businesses adjacent to our trails.

The information obtained from this study will be used by the ATA to secure federal and state funding to complete the trail network from Pittsburgh to Washington, D.C.

As valedictorian of her South Allegheny High School class, she went on to obtain a degree in chemistry from the Oral Roberts University, and now works full time as a cytotechnologist (reading PAP smears).

# ...and the PREZ sez...


A substantial portion of funds needed for Trail segments like Primrose to Venice (I.e. McDonald to Cecil) are unavailable until the administrative procedures for ISTEA and BESTEA financing are determined by PADOT.

Also the disposition of 18 road crossings, under the jurisdiction of the Public Utility Commission must be decided before MTC is able to proceed with projects like the Morganza Road crossing in Hendersonville. MTC is pursuing this matter jointly with PADOT and DCNR. A decision is expected early next year.

Efforts are being made to reach formal agreements with municipalities, state agencies, the County of Washington and land owners that have a variety of interests and concerns regarding the development of the Montour Trail which is, as you know, to be a really continuous hiking biking trail from PA Rt 51 near Groveton to Clairton.

More immediate, Amerikohl begins a coal strip mining operation between Boggs Run (Bugay Drive) and US Rt 22 later this year. The result will be an additional 2 more miles of Trail. That plus another 3 miles from Champion to Quicksilver by next Spring will provide 17 con-

tinuous miles of Trail – something MTC is working on diligently to achieve.

## MTC aids Alliance's River Sweep Clean Up

Manpower and equipment furnished by the MTC were vital to the success of the Montour Run cleanup conducted by sixty volunteers from the Montour Valley Alliance and Duquesne Light on June 20. The volunteers for this event, which was held in conjunction with the six state River Sweep cleanup of the Ohio River Basin, removed an enormous amount of illegally dumped trash from a wooded site overlooking the Montour Trail, Montour Run, and Meeks Run near the Trail's Hassam Road parking area in Moon Township.

Because of space limitations, the

trash removed had to be transported to the parking area for transfer to a dumpster. MTC's trail truck and tractor, operated by Pete Merther and Steve Schotting, handled much of this material. The Southwest Regional Office of the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection furnished supplies and made arrangements for placement of the dumpster by BFI Waste Systems free of charge. Moon Township Police helped with traffic control, and the Moon Township Municipal Authority made space available at the Sewage

Treatment Plant for parking.

The Department of Environmental Protection was extremely pleased by the number and enthusiasm of the volunteers, which exceeded all expectations. "I've never seen a Sweep group that worked harder or got so much done," said Terry Pallas, DEP's Chief of Water Quality Management for South-

western Pennsylvania, who helped organize the cleanup.

And to prevent further dumping, the property owner has barricaded the entrance.

# MTC getting serious about discourteous bikers

At its July meeting, the MTC board struggled earnestly with an issue of grave concern: unsafe biking on the trail.

Findlay Township police have received several complaints about bikers traveling too fast or failing to pass on the left. A wide range of radical steps could be taken to combat the problem. For example:

\* New signs stating "Surgeon General's Warning: It is unsafe to pass on the right."

\* Posted speed limits, with local constables setting radar.

\* Board members patrolling the trail with camouflaged baseball bats protruding horizontally from their handlebars to skewer bikers passing carelessly.

\* Situating the "rules of the trail" signs in the middle of the trail, forc-

ing all users to stop and read them.
\* Publicizing, in local newspapers,
an artist's rendering of unsafe bik-

The board deferred, for now, authorizing any of these draconian options, in the hope that the problem will be resolved if everyone who reads this newsletter can encourage their neighbors on the trail to exercise caution and courtesy!

## Johnston bridge repair

Many members of the Montour Trail Council, (MTC) are probably unaware, that the council owns the Johnston Road bridge in Mt. Pleasant Township, Washington County. This road bridge was built by the Montour Railroad in 1927 to accommodate vehicular traffic over the railroad right of way on the Westland Branch (see trail map near mile 25). The bridge was acquired by the MTC as part of the purchase of the Montour Railroad right of way in Washington County. Recently, MTC has become keenly aware of this ownership. Twice they have had to repair sections of the wooden deck. The most recent repair occurred on Saturday, August 1, 1998.

In preparation for this work,MTC President, Dick Quasey sent notices to all of the local newspapers advising that the bridge would be closed for repairs. At 8:30 am on Saturday morning, August 1, the bridge was closed and a great turnout of fourteen (14) volunteers commenced working. This great crew included: Dave Wright, Don Berty, Ray Johnston, Barry Johnston, Dick Quasey, John Hooton, Bob Boyce, Ed Cupanzic, Hoyt Hall, Neal Phillips, Dave Lewis, Craig Lewis Merle Schermer and Dennis Pfeiffer.

This bridge deck is rather unique when compared to most of the road bridges in Western PA.. It consists of wood 2 by 6's turned on end and nailed to stringers 3 1/2 feet apart. The section to be repaired was 10 1/2 foot wide by 5 1/2 foot long starting at the western abutment.

After much manipulating with a Sawzall and worm circular saw, the bad section was removed. The crew cleaned out underneath the removed section and then started nailing the 10 1/2 foot 2 by 6's to the western abutment and stringers. The process went very well with 1/2 inch shims being used where required. However, as the unrepaired section became smaller, it was more difficult to swing the hammers. A brainstorming session ensued on the best way to complete the remaining 10 1/2 foot by 10 1/2 inch unrepaired section. Barry Johnston calculated the width would at least require 5 1/2 or possibly six 2 by 6's.

The consensus was to nail at least five 2 by 6's together and place them into the remaining hole as one unit. After the 5th board was nailed together Barry eyeballed (or measured - no one knew for sure), the remaining hole and said, "Lets go for it." The sixth 2 by 6 was nailed to the others. Now came the moment of truth! When the piece was laid into the slot, only about six inches on one end would fit. This started a process that seemed to shrink the wood to fit the hole. Three or four volunteers would stand on one side of this huge piece of lumber as another volunteer smashed the opposite side downward with enormous thrusts of a sledge hammer. This process went back and forth between sides as the huge piece of lumber slowly went into place. After about ten minutes, the piece finally was flush with the other portions of the deck! Amazingly, the piece was then toe nailed into place. Barry Johnston was commended for his enormous foresight.

During the day as this decking work was progressing, some other work relative to the bridge was occurring. Merle Schermer, a structural bridge engineer for the RBA Group, was on site per the Montour Trails request to inspect the

entire bridge. Merle said the bridge was sound and the 15 ton weight limit would probably still apply.

Also occurring this day was a bridge surface cleaning party. The bridge surface near the railings was cleaned of an enormous amount of accumulated dirt and stone. The cleaning was necessary, because Mt. Pleasant Township volunteered to tar and chip the bridge deck on the same day they tar and chip Johnston Road. Bill Dinsmore, Chairman of Mt. Pleasant Supervisors and Road Crew Director, was also on site to inspect the repaired section. According to Bill, the tar and chipping will occur on August 24.

Everything considered it was a very satisfying workday with all things accomplished as planned by 2:00 p.m. that afternoon.

The MTC would like to thank all the dedicated volunteers for their hard work and to Mt. Pleasant Twp. for their cooperation. In addition an extra special thanks to Dave Wright, Dick Quasey and Don Berty for organizing the work, obtaining work materials and meeting with the Mt. Pleasant Township Supervisors.

The "grapevine" also says that there are other good Samaritans out there doing lots of Trail deeds happily, and anonymously.


